I. DA AGO FORM 233.—Paragraphs 1 and 2, section I, DA Circular 150, 1948, are reestablished and the supersession note on SR 55-765-5—AFR75-26, 28 April 1949, is amended accordingly.

II. JANAP 118 (B).—JANAP 118 (B), revision of Joint Visual Call Sign Book, now being distributed by The Adjutant General, has been approved for joint and intra-service use. This publication is effective upon receipt.

III. JANAP 149.—JANAP 149, Wartime Instructions for Merchant Ships (Radio), now being distributed by The Adjutant General is a Joint Chiefs-of-Staff publication and is approved for joint and intra-service use. This publication will become effective by separate instructions.

IV. MEDICAL DEPARTMENT OFFICERS.—1. General.—This circular contains the only existing provisions for promotions of commissioned officers in the Army of the United States upon separation from the service and is furnished for information and appropriate action, when indicated. (Previous policy on this subject and authority for promotions by field commanders thereunder was contained in WD Circular 140, 1946, as amended.) The provisions for promotions of officers upon relief from active duty contained in WD Circular 140, 1946, as amended, were terminated on 31 December 1947 for all personnel except those officers who had obtained the time-in-grade and efficiency index requirements thereof by 30 June 1947, and who were—

- a. Retained in the service by reason of hospitalization, or
- b. Linguistic specialists retained in the service against their will, or
- c. Medical Department officers.

WD Circular 140, 1946, as amended, expired on 31 March 1949, and since that date no authority has existed for field commanders to promote thereunder. It has been determined that no linguistic specialists are still on active duty who have been retained in the service against their will, and provisions have been made in each case for promotion of officers eligible under the terminal leave promotion policy who have been retained in the service by reason of hospitalization. Promotions of Regular officers of the Medical Department under the terminal leave promotion policy upon separation from the service are no longer authorized. The policy contained herein is therefore applicable only to non-Regular officers of the

Medical Department, including Medical Corps, Dental Corps, Veterinary Corps, Medical Service Corps, Army Nurse Corps, and Women's Medical Specialist Corps.

2. Eligibility requirements.—*a.* Non-Regular officers of the Medical Department who have had active service, not necessarily consecutive, of more than 2 years subsequent to 16 September 1940 and prior to 30 June 1947, and who as of 30 June 1947 had an efficiency index of 35 or more, and who have not been promoted in the Army of the United States while on active duty, are eligible for one-grade promotion, coincident with processing for relief from active duty.

b. Non-Regular officers of the Medical Department who have served time-in-grade on active duty since 16 September 1940 and prior to 30 June 1947, as specified below, and who had an efficiency index of 40 or more as of 30 June 1947, and who have not been promoted in the Army of the United States since 30 June 1947, are eligible for one-grade promotion, coincident with processing for relief from active duty.

- (1) As second or first lieutenant, for promotion to first lieutenant or captain... 18 months.
- (2) As captain or major, for promotion to major or lieutenant colonel... 24 months.
- (3) As lieutenant colonel, for promotion to colonel... 30 months.
- (4) Oversea service performed prior to 1 May 1946 will be credited as time and one-half in computing time-in-grade under this subparagraph.

c. A Medical Department officer demoted under the officer grade readjustment program will be eligible for promotion to the grade from which demoted upon relief from active duty.

d. A Medical Department officer demoted under the officer grade readjustment program who, prior to demotion, has established eligibility under *a* or *b* above for promotion to a higher grade than that from which demoted will retain such eligibility upon ultimate relief from active duty, and will be promoted to such grade, incident to his processing for relief from active duty.

e. A Medical Department officer promoted since entry on active duty and subsequently demoted for cause is not eligible for promotion under *a* above but may qualify for promotion under *b* above, only service subsequent to the date of demotion and prior to 30 June 1947 being counted in determining time-in-grade, provided service since demotion has been honorable.

f. No officer is eligible for promotion under the provisions of this circular who was separated from the service after 30 June 1947 and has been subsequently recalled to active duty.

g. No officer shall be eligible for promotion under the provisions of this circular whose separation is caused by reclassification procedures, or by action to avoid such procedures, or who is separated from the service under other than honorable conditions.

3. Determination of eligibility.—It is desired that all commanders having custody of personnel records of officers of the Medical Department immediately review those records and determine so far as possible the eligibility of each officer. When it is determined or appears that an officer of the Medical Department is eligible for promotion under the provisions of this circular, it is further desired that a report in letter form for each case be submitted to The Adjutant General, Attention: AGPO-P, outlining the facts of eligibility as far as can be determined. The Adjutant General will determine the eligibility of each officer so reported and will provide eligible officers with evidence for use by commanders as authority for promotion to the proper grade on relief from active duty, subject to continued

eligibility. (See par. 2*g*.) When the relief from active duty of an apparently eligible officer is to be accomplished at an early date, reports will be submitted by the most practicable means which will insure determination of eligibility for promotion prior to relief from active duty. Reports submitted by other than ordinary mail will indicate the contemplated date of relief from active duty.

4. Promotion.—Commanders issuing orders for relief from active duty of officers will, upon authorization from The Adjutant General in each case under the provisions of paragraph 3, issue an appropriate letter order for promotion to the grade indicated in the Army of the United States, with this circular cited in promotion order as the authority therefor.

5. Miscellaneous.—*a.* Promotions will be made in the Army of the United States. Such promotions are temporary, terminate automatically on relief from active duty, and do not affect the status or grade of the promoted individual in the Officers' Reserve Corps, or in the National Guard of the United States.

b. Officers of the Army Nurse Corps and Women's Army Corps will not be promoted to a grade higher than lieutenant colonel. Officers of the Women's Medical Specialist Corps will not be promoted to a grade higher than captain.

c. Promotions will be made and dated on the date of relief from active duty. No retroactive promotions and no antedated orders will be issued.

d. Promotion orders will assume acceptance by the officer to whom the promotion is tendered. Declination in appropriate cases must be indorsed by the officer to whom the promotion is tendered, over his personal signature.

e. Each officer promoted will be issued a separate letter order. One copy of each letter order will be forwarded promptly to The Adjutant General, attention: AGPO-P.

f. Model form letter for promotion is given below.

VI. PROGRAM OF LANGUAGE AND AREA TRAINING.—**1. General.**—*a. Mission.*—The mission of the language and area program, authorized by section I, paragraph 3*e*, SR 350-230-1, is to provide carefully selected officers, potentially qualified for high-level staff and/or command assignments, with such knowledge of the intelligence aspects of languages and areas as will enable them,

when assigned to positions of responsibility, to form sound intelligence estimates or to render proper command decision.

b. *Scope.*—Language and area training will be provided for selected officers only and will extend up to 4 years in length. Normally, 1 to 2 years will be spent at institutions within the United States, followed by 1 or 2 years overseas.

c. *Composition.*—Language and area training will be provided at the following schools:

- (1) Army Language School, Presidio of Monterey, California.
- (2) Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut.
- (3) Columbia University, New York, New York.
- (4) Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey.
- (5) Stanford University, Stanford, California.
- (6) Detachment "R," ID, GSUSA, Regensburg, Germany.
- (7) Detachment "S," ID, GSUSA, Tokyo, Japan.
- (8) Training under the supervision of certain United States Military Attaché offices as prescribed by the Director of Intelligence, General Staff, United States Army.

d. *Control.*

- (1) The Director of Intelligence, General Staff, United States Army, will be responsible for—
 - (a) Operation and administration of the Army Language School.
 - (b) The allocation of quotas to the Department of the Army.
 - (c) Supervision and review of curricula at those civilian institutions, overseas schools, and detachments listed in c above.
- (2) The administration of students will be in accordance with current policy of the Department of the Army.

2. *Classes and courses.*—a. *Types.*—The following types of courses will be presented:

- (1) Language and area courses will be presented to selected Russian, Japanese, Chinese, Greek, Persian, Turkish, and Arabic students only. They will involve three to four years' study, with the first year almost entirely devoted to obtaining fluency in the languages, whereas subsequent years will stress the political, economic, sociological, and topographical aspects of the general areas being studied. It is contemplated that—
 - (a) The first year's instruction will be conducted at the Army Language School, Presidio of Monterey, California, in all seven languages.
 - (b) Thereafter, the sequence of training will be as follows:
 1. *Japanese.*
 - a. To Stanford University, Stanford, California, for 1 year.
 - b. To Detachment "S," ID, GSUSA, Tokyo, Japan, for remainder of course.
 2. *Russian.*
 - a. To Columbia University, New York, New York, for 1 year.
 - b. To Detachment "R," ID, GSUSA, Regensburg, Germany, for remainder of course.
 3. *Chinese.*
 - a. To the Army Language School, Presidio of Monterey, California, for 18 months.
 - b. To Yale University, New Haven, Connecticut, for 1 year.
 - c. On-the-job training with the appropriate United States Military Attaché.

4. *Persian.*

- a. To Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey, for 1 year.
- b. On-the-job training with the appropriate United States Military Attaché.

5. *Arabic.*

- a. To Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey, for 1 year.
- b. On-the-job training with the appropriate United States Military Attaché.

6. *Greek.*

- a. To Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey, for 1 year.
- b. On-the-job training with the appropriate United States Military Attaché.

7. *Turkish.*

- a. To Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey, for 1 year.
- b. On-the-job training with the appropriate United States Military Attaché.

b. *Starting dates of classes.*

- (1) Persian, Greek, Arabic, Turkish, Japanese, and Russian classes commence 15 September 1949.
- (2) Chinese language class commences 7 November 1949.

c. *Requirements.*—Requirements for the fiscal year 1950 of the Department of the Army for language and area training are as follows:

3. *Qualifications.*—The following eligibility qualifications are established for language and area students, with the Director of Intelligence, General Staff, United States Army, being authorized to grant waivers in exceptional cases:

- a. Regular Army officer.
- b. Volunteer.
- c. Qualified in basic arm.
- d. Adaptable or qualified for General Staff duties.
- e. Not over 30 years of age at time of application.

4. *Applications.*—a. Army officers desiring to apply for language and area training will submit application through channels to the commander of their major command or head of their administrative or technical service, who will then forward the applications to The Adjutant General, Attention: CSGPA-O-S&A, with statement as to the officer's availability for the assignment. All applications must reach The Adjutant General not later than 1 August 1949.

b. Applications will be forwarded to the major headquarters concerned, regardless of the immediate availability or essentiality of the individual submitting application.

c. Officers on assignment overseas will not be returned for the purpose of taking language and area training prior to the normal expiration of their tour of duty. Officers on foreign duty who desire such training will apply for this type of training not later than 6 months prior to their departure for the zone of interior.

d. Each application will include the following information:

- (1) Name, rank, and serial number.
- (2) Date of birth.
- (3) Education, giving high schools and colleges attended, approximate class standings, average grades, scholastic honors, scholarships, and degrees.
- (4) Total years' service and synopsis of that service.
- (5) Category.
- (6) Language studies, approximate grades, fluency attained in speaking, reading, writing (excellent, good, fair, poor).
- (7) Scores obtained in Language Aptitude Test and the Language Proficiency Test, if available at the time application is accomplished.
- (8) A statement listing the language and area training desired in order of preference.
- (9) Reasons requested training is desired.
